PHS Boys Soccer is coming off run to state title game

The Parkland High School boys soccer team just had one of its best seasons in program history in 2024, winning the District 11 title and finishing runner-up in both the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference and PIAA state championship games.

The Trojans went 25-3 overall.

Head coach Scott Mang, entering his fourth season at the helm, loses a majority of that roster as 14 players graduated.

This season, Parkland welcomes back a senior leadership group that includes Kerem Adali, Lincoln Fritz, Tal Pollard, Chris Park, Anthony Bautista, Noah Dopera, James Whitehead and Ryan Bender.

Even with an almost brand-new roster, the goals remain the same for the Trojans in 2025.

"Everyone knows the expectations of playing for and coaching at Parkland," Mang said. "We will continue to work diligently at being great students, becoming young men with great character, caring for our community and communities around us, building a strong team bond, continuing to create an environment that prepares boys to play at the college level and improving our craft as soccer players and coaches."

"Our end goal is to always compete for the EPC regular season, EPC tournament, District 11 and PIAA championships."

"This season we will have a mixture of returning players who have big-game experiences with some rising junior varsity players who are chomping at the bit to make their mark on the Parkland boys soccer program," said Mang. "I'm hoping that training with the 2024-2025 team puts them in a better position to meet the demands of playing in the EPC sooner rather than later."

"We will be a team that is very fit, players will have the ability to play in multiple positions and in a variety

of tactical formations, they are excellent young men, brothers on and off the field and they work their socks off in training."

"We have the entire coaching staff back, so our job will be to create a training environment with a growth mindset; one that is physically demanding, mentally challenging, fun and supportive for all of the players in the program. We need to provide consistency to the boys as we focus daily on meeting and surpassing the standards of excellence established by previous

Parkland football has chance to repeat

There hasn't been a repeat winner of the District 11 6A football tournament since the 2017 and 2018 seasons. The last team to do it was Parkland, and the Trojans have the opportunity to be repeat district champions following the 2025 regular season. Parkland finished the 2024 regular season 8-2 and then won three consecutive games in districts, defeating Emmaus 17-3 in the final to win gold.

Once again, the Trojans will be led

by head coach Tim Moncman, and will also feature a lot of the same assistant coaches, including Mike Facchiano, Chris Kinane and Bob Ruisch.

Last season, Parkland moved the ball and scored some points, finishing with 4,375 yards of total offense.

The Trojans bring back a couple of skilled position players, including running backs T.J. Lawrence and Naquan Thomason, along with wide receiver Nassim Adams. The front five will also be strong and

experienced.

Lawrence rushed for 1,157 yards and 13 touchdowns, while catching 25 passes for 328 and two scores. Adams recorded 33 receptions for 402 yards and a touchdown.

"We're returning multiple offensive line starters to block for the run game with T.J. and Naquan," said Facchiano. "New quarterback Finn Coen is replacing Osmany Guzman, who graduated. We will look to play with varying tempos and distribute passing game to returners Nassim, Blake Nassry and

Jude Ruisch."

Defensively, the Trojans are looking to be stout once again, led by returning players like defensive end Domenic Martrich, defensive linemen Matt Dorsey and Julian Diaz, along with linebacker Jaren Sanchez.

"An experienced front seven will be led by Martrich, Dorsey, Diaz, Lawrence and Jaren Sanchez," Facchiano said. "The defensive backs will be led by Nassim and Blake Nassry, with additions of Jeremie

PHS looks to take another step forward

The Parkland High School field hockey team continued its string of consecutive successful seasons with another one in 2024, finishing the year 15-6-1 overall and 10-3 in the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference, winning a game in the EPC and District 11 3A playoffs and advancing to the final four of both tournaments.

In most years, teams have to rebuild after successful seasons where a number of players graduate and move on from the program. But head coach Julie Nelson is in a good spot with her team entering the 2025 regular season, as it only lost one starter/key player from a year ago.

Some of the top returning players for the Trojans this season include Jenna Mayer,

Lila Temchatin, Kendall Pattishall, Audrina Stewart, Leah Frew, Olivia Estaban and Cecilia Kleckner.

This is a group that will be counted on to continue to build and grow from last season and keep the Trojans near the top of the conference and district. Nelson touched on some of the strengths and areas of improvement for her team heading into this season.

"We have lots of returning starters, versatile stick skills and shooting skills," said Nelson. "We're going to be fast offensively, have a three-year varsity goalie and the girls are eager to overcome a tough season last year. We need to have consistency of execution, finishing in the circle, defensive organization."

Parkland fell to rival and eventual champion Emmaus in both the EPC and District 11

semifinal rounds.

Some key newcomers that will be counted on this season to contribute include Alana Vasilakos, Avrie Arnfeldt, Kamryn Karrat and Sydney Laputka.

Nelson is excited about the group this season, one she is very familiar with and one she feels has the talent and experience and leadership to win.

"We built a team on skill, grit and unity," Nelson said. "We were

not pleased with the outcome of last season and this year we are looking to overcome and exceed our own expectations.

"We have the talent to compete with anyone this year and we have a tough schedule to challenge us. Our chemistry is strong and we have a lot of speed offensively that we are going to use to our advantage."

"We're excited to get things going for another season and to be able to defend our title," said Facchiano. "We know the target will be on our backs. They're used to that. The guys have been training hard and are ready to hit the field for another successful season."

The Parkland High School girls tennis team had a ton of success last season, completing most of its goals and winning two different championships.

The Trojans finished the 2024 season 20-1 overall and 15-0 in the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference, earning a regular season and EPC tournament title.

They also claimed the District 11 3A team

championship along the way, before falling in the first round of the state tournament.

While first-year head coach Candace Young saw a large group of seven seniors graduate following last season, she also has a talented group coming back, led by senior captains Lexie Warsing (singles) and Kate Gilchrist (doubles), junior captains Kiana Miles (doubles) and Hannah Schmoeyer, along

Trojan girls soccer poised to bring back titles

The Parkland High School girls soccer team under 19-year head coach Al Haddad has annually been known to hoist either an Eastern Pennsylvania Conference or District 11 championship trophy. Last season, the Trojans fell just short of each of those goals.

But in 2025, Parkland is poised to bring back the program back to the top of the league and district. The Trojans finished last year 17-4-2 overall and were the EPC runners-up and a District 11 semifinalist, falling to rival Emmaus.

Haddad noted the returning players are seniors Katie Sammarco, Isabella Hallal, Avery Maier, Jummai Umaru, Megan Tarantino, Keira Shearer and Sarah Huff, juniors Kennedy

Perkins, Libby Grice, Liana Zurinskas, Kelly Bates and Hanna Hertzog, sophomores Adrian Rizzotto, Mackenzie McNeely, Delilah Zaiter and Maia Rojas-Ondra.

Top newcomers include juniors Sarah Avila, Shri Desai, Sarai Wellington and Mackenzie Ashner and freshmen Chloe Sammarco and Lila Zuber.

"We have seven senior leaders that will be guiding us this season," said Haddad. "They have been demonstrating since the last day of the season last year what they wanted to see and how this season to play out."

"They have taken upon themselves to lead from the start and create the chemistry to climb back to the top. The team level of intensity and communication all around has been fantastic."

Losing to Central Catholic in the conference final and then falling a game short of the district title game has motivated the Trojans heading into this season.

"We never take for granted winning a championship and Central Catholic clearly was the best team last year,"

Haddad said. "But in all honesty, it hasn't sat well with everyone involved in how we played last year."

"Like every year, we want to be better in September than August, and better in October than September. If we can focus on that, I feel we will be in the running at the end of the season."

PHS golfers go 8-2 in first 10 matches

The Parkland High School golf team got its season underway more than three weeks ago.

The Trojans were 8-2 through their first nine matches with a team that features a solid core of returning players along with some newcomers to the team who could make an impact for first year head coach Ryan Nunamaker.

Senior Landen Benner returns to the top of the line up after the best season of his varsity career when he posted a stroke average of 78.2.

"Landen is an integral part of our team," said Nunamaker. "He was a

state qualifier last season and worked hard in the off-season to medal his senior season. Landen is a leader for our younger players on and off the golf course."

Senior Andrew Sundstrom is back in the line up after missing his junior season with an injury.

"His game is getting into form and he should make a strong push to qualify for the state tournament," said Nunamaker. "Andrew is a leader for the guys on our team and works hard to get the best out of everyone."

Junior Charlie Gold averaged 81.9 last season and finished second in the league championship tournament.

"He has worked hard to be more consistent from tee to green this off season," said Nunamaker. "Charlie has great scrambling ability on the golf course. He has high goals once again this season to qualify for the state tournament."

Senior Gabe Chase posted an 83.6 average as a junior and is looking to keep getting lower in his final high school season.

"Gabe brings great leadership to our program," said Nunamaker. "He is the one who can bring everyone together. Gabe has worked hard on his game and he continues to get better each season."

It had been 10 straight seasons that the Parkland High School girls volleyball team claimed either an Eastern Pennsylvania Conference or District 11 title, or both.

But last season, the Trojans fell short of both championships, falling in the semifinal round of EPCs and in the championship match at districts.

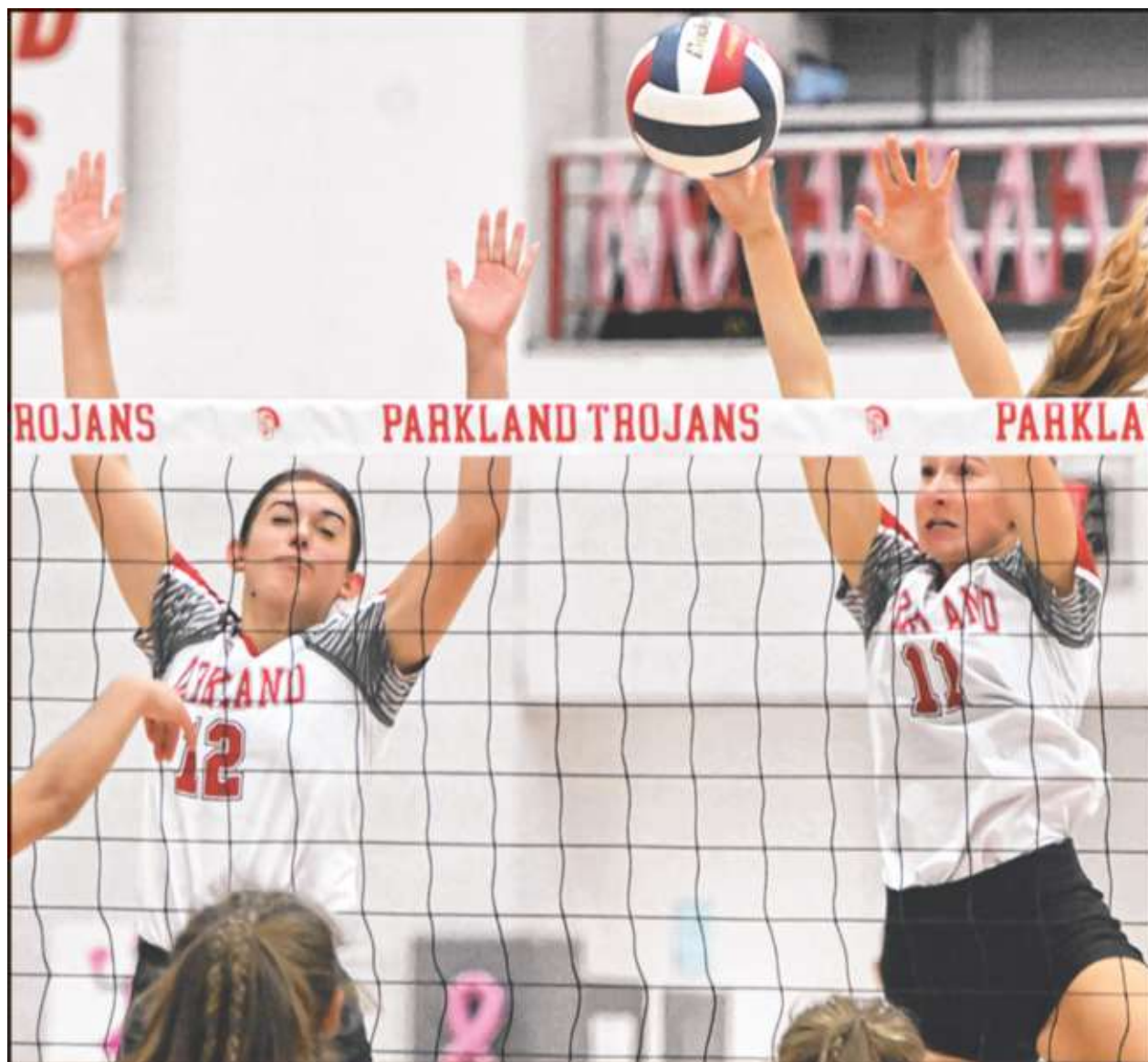
Parkland finished 17-8 overall and won its opening match at the PIAA tournament.

Some of the top returning players to this year's squad include senior middle hitter Kasia Burda and senior opposite hitter Sarah Paugh and sophomore setters Josee Kim and Gabby Brader.

Some key newcomers that will contribute in the lineup more often this year include junior opposite hitter Riley Schilling and junior defensive specialists Zoey Leach and Adi Ochoa, along with sophomore outside hitter Gabby Nissen, sophomore middle hitter Genevieve Supeck and sophomore libero Chloe Coonradt.

Head coach Mike Krause sees several strengths in this year's group.

"We will be a strong serving team," said Krause. "We will rely on our defense and passing. This is a very athletic

group on the entire roster. Our offense is developing. We will need time to develop the tempo of our hitters with the setting. We will have good

control of the volleyball. The team has demonstrated relentless pursuit of the ball.

"They have been making athletic plays

when the offense is out of system. Our collective serve speed is fast and aggressive in every rotation."

Then there are also

some areas to still work on.

"We need to get more reps in the gym to develop consistency with the offensive reads of

the play to assist in the decisions of attack," Krause said. "We made our offense basic to allow for ball control with our attack. We are working to develop a fast tempo with the offense in preparation for the postseason we hope to be a participant. We are identifying positional comfort and performance.

"Our offensive attack needs to develop more in-play swings to extend rallies. Our scrimmage today showed growth in that area over the course of the first week."

With the dawn of a new season upon them, Krause is excited for what this group will bring to the floor, searching to get back to the top of the league and district.

"Our floor game should be very good," Krause said. "If we can improve our transition from the floor game to offense, we will be very competitive. We should be able to earn points with our serve through aces or by neutralizing the opponents offensive opportunities.

"The hitting by our two seniors, Kasia and Sarah will be essential in the early part of our season. If they continue to attack the opponents court in various areas, it will give us time to develop our outsides and the other middle position.

Trojan girls harriers expect to improve on 14-3 season

With a young and inexperienced line up last season, the Parkland girls cross country team ran to a 14-3 record. Parkland finished third at the East Penn Conference meet and was fifth at districts last fall.

With just two graduates from last year's top seven, the Trojans will once again be one of the top teams in the area and could make a push for league and district titles in 2025.

"The group as a whole has improved tremendously and they'll bring that confidence into every meet this season," said head coach Kelly Bracetty. "This group of girls encourage each other to improve and bring such a positive climate in every practice."

Junior Harshita Keerthi will likely lead the Trojans this year. She placed fifth at districts last year and earned a trip to the state championship meet.

Bracetty called Keerthi "a quiet force on the course. She will

challenge many of the top girls in the district this year."

Emma Carlson was also a state qualifier last year after placing 14th at districts. Bracetty said the senior is a "leader and wonderful role model in everything she does. She puts the team first and pushes each girl to believe in herself."

Sophomore Dani Schultz returns and gives the team a reliable runner in the front part of the pack who will push from start to finish. Sophomore Kenzi Schultz will also be part of the team's top five in every race, according to Bracetty, who added that Kenzi Schultz is "always smiling and encouraging her teammates."

Sophomore Lilah Ellis worked her way into a place in the varsity line up. Her head coach is "excited to see all of her hard work over the last year pay off."

Sophomore Madison Anthony and Parker Tatum are also part of this year's varsity team. Tatum was in the line up for last year's district race.

Senior Violet Forte and junior Madelyn Kruk also return to the line up this season.

Several other runners could help the team if called upon, including Elayna Kocher (Sr.), Emma Clewell (Sr.), Anastasia Pino (Soph.), Carly DeSmedt (Jr.), Gabby Hochmiller (Sr.), Eve Horvath (Sr.), Marley Boyle (Sr.), Juliana Varano (Sr.), Amara Saadeh (Fr.), Rebecca Vazquies (Fr.), Addison Winfield (Sr.), Ashley Gaynor (Fr.), Sophia Madrid (Fr.).

The Trojans could be in the mix near the top of the league and district this season.

Defending district champ Emmaus returns

two-time individual champ Mady McCartney to the top of the line up, but the Hornets graduated three members of their top five from last season.

Easton, the runner-up at districts last year, also graduated three runners from its top five at districts last year.

Individually there will be a lot of experience in the postseason this October as only one senior (Emmaus' Payton Campbell) finished in the top five in last year's District 11 championships. The other four are expected to return this season.

Bracetty is pleased with her team heading into the season. The Trojans are looking to finish in the top two spots at districts in order to qualify for states as a team this fall.

"The young group of freshmen we had last year return with experience and will help lead the way this year, along with our upperclassmen returners of Harshita Keerthi and Emma Carlson, both

state qualifiers from last year," she said. "This year they will be ready to compete with the other talented programs in the district. Their goal is to make it to states as a team. Keerthi and Carlson should stand out among other district talent while Dani and Kenzi Schultz, Lilah Ellis, Violet Forte, Madi Kruk, Parker Tatum and Madi Anthony have already shown much improvement and will contribute to our top seven. Look for newcomers Elayna Kocher to make a statement this year, as well as other newcomers Emma Clewell and Amara Saadeh.

"We have a large number returning and graduation did not really affect us."

Bracetty is also pleased to see a large roster this season.

"We've grown in numbers on the girls side as well to 40 runners and they will learn a lot this season under the guidance of our talented upperclassmen," she said.

Boys XC team seeks fourth straight EPC crown

The Parkland boys cross country team was perfect during the regular season last year, going 17-0 on its way to an East Penn Conference regular season title and league meet championship.

It was the Trojans' third consecutive league meet title.

What eluded Parkland in 2024 was a district championship. Despite finishing with six of the top 21 finishers at districts, the Trojans came up short on their quest to complete the three-peat after securing titles in 2022 and 2023.

"The boys return their core and are extremely determined to bring home the district championship title this year," PHS head coach Kelly Bracetty said. "Typically, the first team

to have five runners finish before other teams would win a meet. Last year we had six runners cross the finish line at districts, while Nazareth had four in; and we had six runners finish while Emmaus only had three in. But somehow, the way the scoring worked, we came in third place as a team."

Nazareth won the District 11 Class 3A championship with 62 points, followed by second-place Emmaus with 72 points. Parkland finished with 74 points.

In their quest at avenging last year's results at districts, the Trojans will return many of their top runners in 2025. Senior Luke McEvoy, who placed fourth at both leagues and districts last year, tops the list of returnees for Bracetty. Senior Marcelo Cas-

tilla (17th at districts), junior Brycen Smith (18th), and senior Logan McEvoy (21st) round out the returning top finishers from districts in 2024.

"Luke McEvoy, Logan McEvoy and Marcelo Castilla will use their experience to lead the team," Bracetty said. "And our strong sophomore and junior class of Brycen Smith, Colin McGuigan, Cole Orloski, and Isaiah Wilson will be ready to showcase their improvements since last year."

McGuigan, a junior, returns after missing his sophomore season in 2023. He figures to be a main piece of the puzzle as he shined at districts as a freshman and placed fifth. Orloski is a sophomore that placed 10th at the EPC Meet and finished 44th at districts last fall.

Newcomer Alex Abosamra is expected to make an immediate impact for the Trojans in 2025. Sophomores Jaiden Zabler (24th at leagues) and Isaiah Wilson (28th), junior Nate Rosenberg and senior Jimmy Huff are also returnees expected to be key cogs in the lineup.

"They were a young team back then, and have worked tremendously hard over the last year," Bracetty said. "They've improved both physically and mentally, and are ready to compete with every team in the district."

"We have also had new runners step in and challenge for a varsity spot. It's a roster of 48 runners who come focused, motivated and ready to put in the work every single practice."

Sophomore Carter Willis averaged 85.1 in his first varsity season last summer.

"Carter had an outstanding freshman year and has made big strides already in the offseason," said Nunamaker. "He has the potential to score well for us throughout the season as his game continues to progress."

Junior Jacob Posocco returns after averaging 83.1 strokes during his sophomore season.

"Jacob is a steady golfer for our program," said Nunamaker. "He is someone who gives himself a chance to go low and help the team. Jacob continues to improve from season to season on the golf course."

Senior John Gerancher heads into his final year of high school with an average of 87.7 from

"John has great leadership abilities and has developed a strong rapport with all the members of the team," said Nunamaker. "He is a grinder on the course and has potential to score low when everything is clicking in his game."

Sophomore Jacob Rapp posted an 88.6 average last season as a

varsity rookie.

"Jacob continues to work hard and fine-tune his game," said Nunamaker. "He worked really hard in the offseason and played a few tournaments to help prepare him more for competition this season. Jacob has a great attitude and continues to work hard."

Some newcomers to this year's team who could see time in the starting line up and even contribute to the team score, include Cole Yakubecke and freshmen Matthew Torres, Ryan Posocco and Thomas Schimmer.
